East Tennessee Historical Society Honors Greene County Initiatives With History Awards of Excellence

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., May 16, 2016 – The East Tennessee Historical Society’s (ETHS) annual Awards of Excellence were presented at the organization’s Annual Meeting on May 3, 2016 at the Foundry on the World’s Fair Park in Knoxville. Since 1982, the Society has been annually recognizing individuals and organizations that have made significant contributions to the preservation, promotion, programming and interpretation of the region’s history. Two Greene County initiatives were among the 31 awards presented.

- **Greeneville Greene County History Museum** received the *Preservation Award* for preservation of the Seth Babb cabin. The cabin of Revolutionary War soldier and pioneer Seth Babb was rescued from the elements, thanks to the work of the Greeneville Greene County History Museum. The cabin was dismantled and rebuilt on museum property across the street from the museum. With the addition of family artifacts, it will serve as a teaching and demonstration tool.
- **Carolyn Gregg** received the *Community History Award* for her contribution to the history of Greeneville and Greene County. Her impressive contributions include research, writing, publications, a children’s book, writing and directing plays, numerous presentations, assisting others with genealogical research, and, with her husband, cleaning, repairing stones, and mowing a historic cemetery (1793).
